- ¹ Names in bold and marked with an asterisk are those who obtained their freedom. Names of owners are listed underneath names of slaves. The name of Tamar's son who won his freedom from Edward Dorsey was illegible. Twenty-three Boston slaves won their freedom through the courts (although Guy Boston died during the final appeals process) and four were freed by their owners, including Lenah's son Daniel, who was set free by Samuel Watkins, and Jenny's children Bet and Daniel and her grandchild Charles, who were freed in 1798 by Richard Sprigg Sr.'s will. Not including Guy Boston, the total was thus twenty-six.
